OVERDOSE PREVENTION

Information for Edmonton's Business Improvement Areas

Edmonton, like many municipalities across Alberta and Canada is experiencing a crisis in opioid-related poisoning (overdose) deaths. Opioid poisonings are at an all time high, exacerbated by the current COVID-19 pandemic. This is a complex public health issue with many factors leading to the significant increase in opioid poisonings today, including the emergence of strong synthetic opioids in the illegal drug supply. It is not just the role of our partners in health to address this crisis in our community, it will take all of us, including the business community to champion local actions and ultimately reduce overdose deaths.

389 Edmontonians died of an opioid-related poisoning in 2020.

This is double the rate seen in 2019
